(a) Explain **one** other ethical guideline broken by telling the participants that the study was about vitamins and vision.

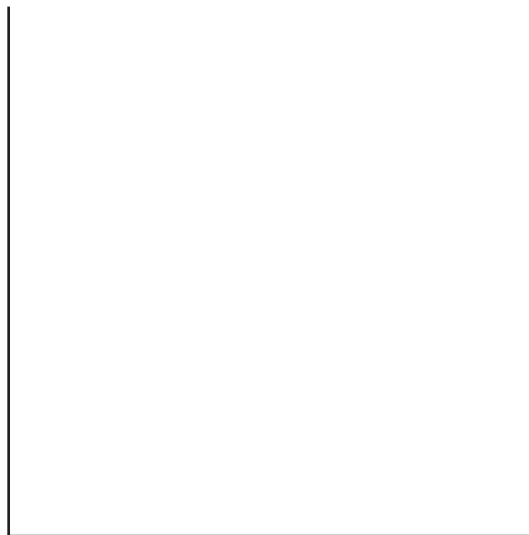
